AMERICAN GROUP PSYCHOTHERAPY ASSOCIATION RECEIVES ACCREDITATION WITH COMMENDATION FROM THE ACCREDITATION COUNCIL FOR CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION

NEW YORK, August 12, 2016 - The American Group Psychotherapy Association announced today that it has been awarded Accreditation with Commendation as a provider of continuing medical education for physicians through the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME). This status, the highest accreditation the ACCME offers, has been awarded for six years for the organization's continuing education programs.



ACCME accreditation seeks to assure the medical community and the public that AGPA provides physicians with relevant, effective, practice-based continuing medical education that supports US health care quality improvement. The ACCME employs a rigorous, multilevel process for evaluating institutions' continuing medical education programs according to the high accreditation standards adopted by all seven ACCME member organizations. These organizations of medicine in the US are the American Board of Medical Specialties, the American Hospital Association, the American Medical Association, the Association for Hospital Medical Education, the Association of American Medical Colleges, the Council of Medical Specialty Societies, and the Federation of State Medical Boards of the US, Inc.

Accreditation with commendation is an exemplary status which is awarded to providers that signifies full compliance of the highest standards in all criteria and accreditation policies. It demonstrates that the AGPA is a learning organization and a change agent for physicians and the patients they serve and part of a system for quality improvement.

"AGPA's continuing education program is a cornerstone in its mission to advance knowledge and research, and provide quality training in group psychotherapy," said Eleanor F. Counselman, Ph.D., CGP, LFAGPA, AGPA President. "It is gratifying to have its quality and standards nationally recognized by the ACCME through Accreditation with Commendation."
