He continues to maintain and provide a very loving example of a husband with Ellen and models the man, therapist, educator and friend, I aspire to be.

Dr. Fehr has provided me with innumerable conversations, where we process, share emotional dialogue and present all of the day's events. He has stood up

for me in ways and moments when my own parents could not muster the courage to defend their son. He has walked me through some of the toughest times of my adult life as he is focused on changing a very tattered past of mine. Dr. Fehr has single-handedly saved me from my own demise as the road I traveled, alone, before meeting him, was leading to the very pits of existence most therapists, mentors and friends only
