Conference Opening Plenary Address: Dr. Paul Wachtel presents "Cyclical Psychodynamics and Group Psychotherapy: Understanding People in Context." Cyclical psychodynamics is an integrative theory rooted in relational psychodynamic principles that incorporates elements of cognitive-behavioral, family systems and experiential approaches. Its relevance to group psychotherapy lies particularly in its strong contextual emphasis. This Plenary address discusses how cyclical psychodynamic theory can contribute to the understanding of the events and processes of group psychotherapy.

Anne and Ramon Alonso Plenary Address: Dr. Elisabeth Rohr presents "<u>Humanity on the Move-Groups Too!</u>" Worldwide migration and refugee movements have turned out to be one of the most challenging issues in the early 21<sup>st</sup> century. Immigration is not only changing societies, but affecting mental health institutions, group therapy and psychotherapy practices as well. Dr. Rohr explores what perspectives for training and practice are needed in the future to address these challenges.

Mitchell Hochberg Memorial Public Education Event: Dr. Jennifer Freyd presents "Institutional Betrayal in Cases of Sexual Violence." Dr. Freyd and her students have discovered that institutional betrayal can exacerbate the harm of sexual trauma as sexually assaulted individuals treated poorly by their institutions show greater levels of distress. Increasing awareness of institutional betrayal will allow individuals, groups and institutions to become healthier.

"We are so fortunate to have nationally renowned speakers present at the AGPA Annual Meeting," said Eleanor F. Counselman, EdD, CGP, LFAGPA, AGPA President. "Each presentation provides an opportunity to explore the connection of current issues in society with the field of group therapy."
